HRSD to Close Eastbound Lane of Indian River Road at Kempsville Road Beginning Friday, July 23rd

—All Lanes to be Open by Monday, August 2nd —

VIRGINIA BEACH – HRSD officials have announced lane closures at the intersection of Kempsville Road and Indian River Road beginning Friday, July 23, 2010.

Motorists are asked to be alert to temporary lane closures in the construction zone due to construction work at this intersection. **The following lane closure schedule can be expected starting at 7 p.m. Friday, July 23, 2010, and lasting until Monday, August 2, 2010, at 5 a.m.:**

One eastbound through lane on Indian River Road will be closed at the Kempsville Road Intersection and **one left turn lane from southbound Kempsville Road** to eastbound Indian River Road will also be closed during this time.

The right turn lane and one through lane on northbound Kempsville Road at the Indian River Road intersection will be closed. Motorists may turn right onto eastbound Indian River Road or proceed on Kempsville Road from the open lane.

Monday through Friday during peak travel times of 7 a.m. to 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. to 7 p.m.: One lane of Indian River Road will remain closed, while all through lanes traveling north on Kempsville Road will be opened to accommodate peak traffic flows.

“We regret these lane closures must be in place longer than expected,” said Shawn Heselton, HRSD, project manager. “The contractor has discovered unexpected obstacles while drilling under Kempsville Road to install a new sewer line. They have also had to replace equipment that was damaged while drilling. This delay and the lane closures have been necessary to protect the public and the workers at the site. Crews will continue to work around the clock so all lanes can be opened as quickly as possible.”

“We apologize for any inconvenience caused by this project, which is essential to ensure HRSD has the infrastructure required to protect public health and our region’s waterways,” said Heselton.
