July 7-22 Lane Closure Planned for Laskin Road Near Regency Hilltop

—Intersection of Laskin Road and Regency Drive to be temporarily closed Tuesday, July 12—

VIRGINIA BEACH –Construction crews will begin installation of concrete pavement in the far right west bound travel lane of Laskin Road near the Regency Hilltop Shopping Center on July 7. The work schedule, which is subject to change due to weather conditions, calls for lane closures in this area through July 22. The service road will be open throughout this pavement restoration project, and at least one access to the businesses in Regency Hilltop Shopping Center will be maintained at all times. Appropriate signage and traffic control devices will mark the required detours and lane closures.

The morning of Tuesday, July 12, the intersection of Laskin Road and Regency Drive will be closed for approximately 24 hours while the existing asphalt is removed and new concrete is poured. Metal plates will then be installed over the fresh concrete so the road can be reopened to traffic. The plates will be removed after the concrete is fully cured, which may take up to three days.

After the Regency Drive intersection has been reopened, the intersection at the Laskin Road entrance to Regency Hilltop Shopping Center will be closed so the existing asphalt can be removed and replaced with new concrete. This is expected to occur the morning of Wednesday, July 13. Metal plates also will be installed at this intersection so it can be reopened to traffic while the concrete cures.
